I. INTRODUCTION

This information is part of the watershed-wide Public Education Plan (PEP) developed to inform the public within the Clinton River watershed, Anchor Bay watershed and Lake St. Clair Direct Drainage about their role in protecting water quality and preventing stormwater pollution. The PEP is a requirement of the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit administered by the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy. The permit regulates stormwater discharges from municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4), in compliance with the provisions of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (Clean Water Act), as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq), and Michigan Act 451, Public Acts of 1994, as amended, Parts 31 and 41. The goal of the MS4 program is to reduce the discharge of pollutants to surface waters of the State. This plan was created by the municipalities and other partners in the Clinton River watershed with the input of stakeholders, regulatory agencies, and professionals in the environmental education field. This plan outlines the public education goals and messages that must be communicated under the requirements of the NPDES Phase I and Phase II regulations.

II. PARTNERS

This Biennial Report details the educational activities and programs carried out for FY 2020 and FY 2021 in fulfillment of the watershed wide collaborative PEP and is submitted by the Clinton River Watershed Council (CRWC) on behalf of Macomb County, Oakland County and the MS4 permit holders that participate in the Stormwater Education Program facilitated by CRWC. MS4 permittees generally include the following municipal entities: cities, townships, villages, county agencies, universities, and school districts. Activities facilitated by the CRWC, Macomb and Oakland Counties, and the MSU Extension Office are reported on behalf of the following permit holders and their nested MS4's:

III. WATERSHED WIDE ACTIVITIES

Michigan Green Schools Program

Oakland County

FY 2020: For the 2019-2020 school year, 121 Oakland County schools earned the Michigan Green School designation by participating in a minimum of 10 out of 20 environmental and/or energy saving activities. Twenty-two (22) of the schools received the special designation of Emerald Schools by successfully participating in 15-19 activities and 82 schools participated in 20 or more activities to earn the special designation of Evergreen status. An awards ceremony was unable to be held to honor the schools due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Twenty-one (21) of the 28 public school districts had schools represented. In addition, 10 of the schools were recognized for participation for all 13 years of the program, 19 schools have participated for 10 years, and 7 schools have participated for five (5) years. One new school joined the program this year.

FY 2021: For the 2020-2021 school year, 77 schools were designated a Michigan Green School. There were 15 schools that also received the special designation of Emerald status by successfully earning an additional 15 points for extra activities and 39 schools earned the Evergreen status, by receiving an extra 20 points. Seventeen (17) of the 28 public school districts were represented in the program this year. Eight (8) schools have participated for all 14 years of the program, 5 schools were recognized for participating for the last 10 years, and 1 school was recognized for participating the past five years. There were three (3) new schools that joined the program. Twelve (12) schools were awarded the "Green Education Award" which was offered for schools that wanted to participate in an environmental activity but could not meet all of the Green Schools requirements due to COVID-19.

Macomb County

FY 2020: 114 Macomb County schools earned Official Michigan Green School status for the 2019-2020 academic year.

FY 2021: 47 schools were able to take part this year. Less schools participated due to covid concerns.

River Day

FY 2020: 8 recreation and stewardship events were promoted and publicized with approximately 135 attendees watershed-wide, and 146 T-shirts distributed to the public. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic fewer events were held in observance of public health and safety.

FY 2021: 21 recreation and stewardship events were promoted and publicized with approximately 1,099 attendees watershed-wide, and 394 T-shirts distributed to the public.

Clinton Cleanup

FY 2020: 17 volunteer trash cleanups, 208 volunteers and approximately 4,700 pounds of trash were collected.

FY 2021: 14 volunteer trash cleanups, 236 volunteers and approximately 2,900 pounds of trash were collected. There was also a native planting for bank stabilization as part of the Clinton River restoration project at Yates Cider Mill. 30 volunteers planted 1200 native plants along the river bank.

Keeping It Clean – Weekly Clean and Trash Runs

The Keeping It Clean volunteer stewardship program includes Weekly Clean, paddling Trash Run cleanups, and other scheduled cleanups that fell outside of the Weekly Clean schedule.

FY 2020: 42 cleanups, 281 volunteers and approximately 6,300 pounds of trash was collected from the Clinton River, its tributaries and surrounding park areas. Of the 42 scheduled cleanups, 14 were cancelled due to COVID-19 health and safety measures, or inclement weather.

Volunteer numbers were low due to COVID-19 concerns. GM and Stellantis encourage their employees to volunteer with CRWC for cleanups, however they did not allow employees to participate in in-person events in most of 2020 and part of 2021.

FY 2021: 52 cleanups, 806 volunteer hours and approximately 18,686 pounds of trash collected from the Clinton River, its tributaries and surrounding park areas. Of the 52 scheduled cleanups, 2 were cancelled due to inclement weather.

Water Festivals

Clinton River Water Festival at Oakland University

FY 2020: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 Clinton River Water Festival was cancelled.

FY 2021: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2021 Clinton River Water Festival was cancelled.

Lake St. Clair Water Festival at Macomb Community College

FY 2020: The in-person event was cancelled to Covid lockdown restrictions but presentations were handed out to 53 teachers for their classes averaging 30 students per class

FY 2021: Virtual presentation viewed live by 1,470 students

Stormwater Management Forums

FY 2020: CRWC scheduled 4 Stormwater Management Forums with a total of 46 attendees. Two of the forums were cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. One of the forums took place in person in Macomb County and the other was held virtually.

FY 2021: CRWC hosted 6 Stormwater Management Forums with a total of 220 attendees. All forums were held virtually due to COVID-19 concerns. Due to EGLE's updated reporting period, two more forums than required were held in FY 2021.

FY 2020: 20 stormwater education presentations were held virtually, or in person, with 830 attendees.

FY 2021: 35 stormwater education presentations were held virtually, or in person, with 491 attendees.

Adopt-A-Stream (AAS) Training Workshops

FY 2020: 8 AAS volunteer trainings, 1 Stonefly Search volunteer training, 3 bug ID workshops, 53 attendees. Of the 8 trainings and 3 bug ID workshops, 5 were cancelled due to COVID-19 precautions.

FY 2021: 8 AAS volunteer trainings, 2 Stonefly Search volunteer trainings, 2 bug ID workshops, 137 attendees.

Adopt-A-Stream Water Quality Monitoring Program

FY 2020: Spring monitoring was cancelled in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic and following best practices. Fall AAS monitoring included 200 participating volunteers and 39 stream sites monitored. 50 volunteers monitored 12 sites for the Winter Stonefly Search in January 2020.

FY 2021: Spring and Fall AAS monitoring included 400 participating volunteers and 41 stream sites monitored. 75 volunteers monitored 15 sites for the Winter Stonefly Search in January 2021. 60 volunteers monitored 13 sites for the Winter Stonefly Search in January 2022.

Stream Leaders Student River Monitoring Program and Student Congress

Students and mentors collect macroinvertebrates, test water chemistry, and observe stream morphology at their stream site to determine water quality. A table of monitoring dates, times, and locations is available from the CRWC upon request. Numbers for participation in the program have been slowly recovering since the COVID-19 pandemic. Since 2021 CRWC has

made the program available in multiple ways to meet the needs of schools and bring the program to a more diverse audience. Live virtual opportunities along with public events have been implemented for this purpose.

FY 2020: In the fall of 2019, 822 students, and 8 schools participated in the Stream Leaders Program. There were 2 schools that cancelled, and some that did not schedule due to the threat of the mosquito transmitted virus, Eastern Equine Encephalitis. In the spring of 2020, all Stream Leaders activities were cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. FY 2021: In the fall of 2020 there were no Stream Leaders events due to the COVID-19 pandemic and protocol being followed by schools. In the spring and fall of 2021 and winter of 2022, 783 students from 17 schools participated in the program and Stream Leaders public events.

RiverSafe LakeSafe

The RiverSafe LakeSafe (RSLs) program is a public education campaign that aims to educate and recognize watershed residents who incorporate best management practices at home to keep our freshwater resources clean and healthy. An annual program report and map of certifications is available from the CRWC upon request.

FY 2020: 3 new certifications, leading to a total of 108 RSLs certifications since the program's inception in 2016. 2020 was a difficult year for people due to the COVID-19 pandemic and interest in the Riversafe LakeSafe program was low. However, in 2021 the program picked back up and met the required certifications per year.

FY 2021: 11 new certifications, leading to a total of 119 RSLs certifications since the program's inception in 2016.

Earth Friendly Fertilizer Program

CRWC distributes fluorescent green "Earth-Friendly Fertilizer" stickers to all participating ACE Hardware Stores to label fertilizers that are zero phosphorous and low or slow-release nitrogen.

FY 2020: 450 stickers distributed to 8 ACE Hardware stores within the watershed.

FY 2021: 350 stickers distributed to 11 ACE Hardware stores within the watershed.

WaterTowns

FY 2020: 8th year of the WaterTowns™ (WT) initiative with a total of 24 communities committed resolutions to participating in the program. Four WT were established in 2020; Berkley, Ferndale, Center Line and Royal Oak.

FY 2021: 9th year of the WaterTowns® (WT) initiative with four new communities joining the program; Clinton Township, Independence Township, Madison Heights and Rochester Hills. The WT program now has a total of 28 communities dedicated to enhancing water resources through education, engagement, and green stormwater infrastructure implementation.

Stormwater Education for Industrial and Commercial Facilities

FY 2020: Development and distribution of Best Management Practices flyers targeting 1) Auto Maintenance Industries 2) Car Washes 3) Landscaping and 4) Schools. In FY 2020, 44 school districts were mailed a cover letter and a copy of the BMP flyer for schools. A copy of the mailing list is available upon request. Other BMP flyers were distributed digitally via the Stormwater Monday email and as hard copies with the stormwater display. Macomb County mailed BMPs to restaurants and landscape companies. Chamber of Commerce events were not attended in FY2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

FY 2021: Development and distribution of Best Management Practices flyers targeting 1) Composting Facilities 2) Homeowners Associations 3) Machine Shops and 4) Scrap Recycling and Auto Salvage Yards. BMP flyers were distributed digitally via Stormwater Monday email and as hard copies when communities host the stormwater display. Macomb County mailed BMPs to restaurants and carpet cleaning companies. In FY 2021 CRWC was awarded an EGLE NPS grant for the translation of 30 BMP and stormwater education flyers. This includes formatting for accessibility, translation into Spanish and Arabic and distribution of materials to communities that CRWC serves within the Clinton River watershed, Lake St. Clair direct drainage and Anchor Bay watershed. Distribution will begin in 2022. Chamber of Commerce events were not attended in FY 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

V. OAKLAND COUNTY SPECIFIC ACTIVITIES

Regional Stormwater Summit

FY 2020: For FY 2020, the 7th Annual Stormwater Summit was held on October 3, 2019 with approximately 250 attendees.

FY 2021: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the event did not take place in FY 2021.

Bulletin Boards

FY 2020/2021: Throughout FY 2020/2021, the WRC had a variety of information related to storm drain awareness on display in its main lobby. Information on the “Seven Simple Steps to Clean Water”, and copies of the “Waterfront Wisdom” Booklet, “Kids Clean Water Calendar” and “Oakland County 24-Hour Pollution Hotline” brochure are available year-round. The Alliance of Rouge Communities developed a variety of seasonal posters on protecting water quality with tips to consider for spring, summer, winter and fall. That poster was framed and hung in the WRC lobby beginning in FY 2017 and is rotated out seasonally.

Dirt Doctors Program

FY 2020/2021: Approximately 640 students and adults in 9+ different presentations at 3 different events were reached in FY 2020. The Dirt Doctors attended events in Detroit, Pontiac, and West Bloomfield. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, 14 scheduled in-person Dirt Doctor events had to be cancelled. As a means to provide the Dirt Doctors educational experience to the public, a pre-recorded Dirt Doctors program was put together in September 2020 and as of September 30, 2021, it has been viewed 136 times. Drain Detectives Program

FY 2020/2021: There were no Drain Detectives programs requested in FY 2020 or 2021.

Enviroscape Watershed Model Program

FY 2020: Approximately 455 students, adults and chaperones in 12 different presentations at three (3) different events were reached in FY 2020. WRC staff presented the Enviroscape watershed model at events in Detroit, Pontiac and White Lake Twp. There were no pre- or post-evaluations administered in FY 2020.

FY 2021: In FY 2021, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, in-person events were impacted and two (2) scheduled presentations had to be cancelled as well as several water festivals. In order to reach people virtually, a 32-minute pre-recorded Enviroscape Watershed Model demonstration was created in September 2020 and is available online at:

Household Hazardous Waste Information

FY 2020: In FY 2020, the Oakland County Waste Resource Management Division sponsored two (2) household hazardous waste disposal days: October 12, 2019 and September 26, 2020 at the Oakland County Service Center in Pontiac. A total of 2,170 residents participated in these events and a total of 315,384 pounds of household hazardous waste was collected. Due to COVID-19, two (2) other events originally scheduled during the year were cancelled.

FY 2021: In FY 2021, the Oakland County Waste Resource Management Division sponsored five household hazardous waste disposal days: October 10, 2020, June 26, 2021 and September 25, 2021 at the Oakland County Service Center in Pontiac, April 24, 2021 at Oxford Middle School in Oxford and July 24, 2021 at Kensington Church in Orion Township. A total of 821,099 pounds of household hazardous waste was collected during the five collection events. Since the program began in 2003, residents of more than 61,000 households have disposed of more than 8 million pounds of hazardous materials which have been recycled or disposed of properly. There were 27,635 website hits in FY2020 and 42,219 website hits in FY2021 to the County's Household Hazardous Waste Recycling Information. There are two solid waste authorities in the southern portion of the county that handle the waste for several member communities. One of these authorities holds several household hazardous waste collection events for residents, while the other offers year-round service for residents of its member communities. A few communities offer their own collection events each year.

Kid's Clean Water Calendar Contest

FY 2020: A total of 715, 4th and 5th graders across Oakland County participated in the 2020 Kids' Clean Water Calendar Contest. A total of 5,500 calendars were distributed across Oakland County. Drawings were submitted from classes representing 18 schools (30 classes). There were also six (6) separate entries from individual residents. An article promoting the 2020 calendar contest was published via the online Oakland County Times on 9/21/2019 (<http://oaklandcounty115.com/2019/09/21/kids-can-enter-art-contest-for-environmental-calendar-deadline-oct-4/>), as well as in the Oakland Press on 9/26/2019, "Fourth and Fifth Graders Invited to Enter Calendar Contest". In FY2020, there were a total of 1,338 hits to the Calendar Contest website.

FY 2021: A total of 181 4th and 5th graders across Oakland County participated in the 2021 Kids' Clean Water Calendar Contest. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and most students learning virtually, the format for submitting entries for the 2021 calendar was changed to an online format. We only received about 20% of the typical participation rate due to the format change. The change did present new opportunities though. We saw a greater diversity of schools represented and we were also able to gain insight into what the students learned by competing in the contest and that information is provided in Appendix 1.

-A total of 5,500 calendars were distributed across Oakland County. A second round of distribution took place in February and March 2021 due to demand across the country from an online website promoting free materials. An additional 2,000 calendars were printed and distributed for a total of 7,500 calendars distributed.

-Drawings were submitted from students representing 25 schools.

Natural Resources Education Program

FY 2020: During FY2020, OCPRC hosted and/or participated in one (1) public education and outreach event (approx. 600 attendees) with water resource-related content. OCPR continues to display and distribute OCPR 'Stop Aquatic Hitchhikers' Brochures which provide ID and control information for the top AIS found at OCPR parks - Eurasian watermilfoil, purple loosestrife, curly leaf pondweed, and starry stonewort. These brochures are kept and distributed via contact stations and boathouses at parks that have public boat access.

FY 2021: During FY2021, OCPR nature centers were closed until July and all major programs were cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions. OCPR continues to display and distribute OCPR 'Stop Aquatic Hitchhikers' Brochures which provide ID and control information for the top AIS found at OCPR parks - Eurasian watermilfoil, purple loosestrife, curly leaf pondweed, and starry stonewort. These brochures are kept and distributed via contact stations and boathouses at parks that have public boat access. OCPR also operated two mobile boat wash stations across the County from late May to late September that provided educational information about aquatic invasive species including prevention, identification and decontamination practices.

A total of \$3,975.00 was spent on ads in FY 2020 (five ads at \$795 ea.)

A total of \$3,975.00 was spent on ads in FY 2021 (five ads at \$795 ea.)

Since April of 2020, MSU Extension staff (Bindu Bhakta, Erick Elgin, Jo Latimore, Paige Filice, Terry Gibb, Lois Wolfson and Ruth Kline-Robach) published seven articles highlighting upcoming MSU Extension programs, resources and water quality protection issues relevant to residents on Oakland County lakes. Topics have included using native plants along the shoreline, maintaining septic systems, drinking water, and lake processes in the winter. Each month they highlight a relevant MSU Extension resource or upcoming program, such as the Michigan Inland Lakes Convention or Introduction to Lakes Online. Articles are sometimes reused for MSUE news for further distribution to continue reaching riparian landowners in Oakland County. In FY 2014, the County went through the solid waste plan amendment process and approved an amendment to the Oakland County Solid Waste Plan to include a proposed transfer station in Pontiac. The amendment received final approval from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality in FY 2015. At this point there is no plan to do a full update to the Oakland County Solid Waste Plan unless the need arises and/or the WRMD is instructed to do so by the State of Michigan. Inland Lake Natural Shoreline Education Program

Several educational programs were held on understanding lake ecology and the importance of natural shorelines on inland lakes. Programs were held for lake residents, natural resource professionals, lake managers, elected and appointed government officials, and educators. A Michigan Natural Shoreline Partnership training for 43 contractors was held on 3/3/20 to train shoreline contractors how to design and install natural shorelines on inland lakes.

The Introduction to Lakes Online course ran two times, once between January - March 2020 with 189 participants, and January - March 2021 with 286 participants. Topics included lake

ecology, watersheds, shorelines, water law, aquatic plants, and citizen involvement. There were also three live chat sessions during each course.

Bindu Bhakta also presented on Inland Lake shoreline solutions on October 14, 2020 to 53 participants as part of the Wild About Backyard Conservation webinar series.

Lake ecosystem content was also included in the two (2) in-person Michigan Conservation Stewards Programs held in Washtenaw County and the Capital Area in Fall 2019, as well as the Virtual Michigan Conservation Stewards Program in Fall 2021.

In 2019, MSU Extension staff helped enroll 43 Oakland County Lakes in the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (MiCORP). There was no program in 2020 due to the pandemic. 20 lakes were enrolled in the 2021 monitoring program.

A 90-minute session, "Protecting inland lakes: Septic system maintenance, policies, and treatment options" was offered as part of the Michigan Inland Lakes Convention on September 18, 2020. The session recording can be found at:

A "Communicating Through Conflict" workshop was also offered at the MILC on 9/17/20 attended by 53 participants. Septic information was provided via MSU Extension news articles and the Septic Education web site (https://www.canr.msu.edu/septic_system_education/).

WHAT IS STORMWATER POLLUTION?

HOW DO AUTOMOTIVE REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE BUSINESSES CONTRIBUTE TO STORMWATER POLLUTION?

- Incorrect storage of used and new vehicle fluids.
- Spills and leaks from auto maintenance such as, oil, gasoline, chemicals, grease and paint.
- Improper cleaning of work sites.

BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES (BMP): Behaviors and practices used by individuals to prevent or reduce stormwater pollution impacts.



CHEMICAL SPILLS

- Never hose gas, oil or other chemical spills down the drain.



CONTROL LITTER

- Be sure workspace and surrounding areas such as parking lots are free of litter, debris and scraps that could end up in storm drains.



SPILL KITS

- Be sure to have properly stocked spill kits on hand.



EDUCATE STAFF

- Teach staff proper handling, storage and disposal of supplies, how to use a spill kit, and where storm drains are located on the property.



DRY MOP METHOD

- Use a dry mop to soak up spills or cover in sawdust or kitty litter and sweep.



CHEMICAL DISPOSAL

- Practice proper disposal of chemicals and automotive fluids.



WHAT IS STORMWATER?

When it rains, water runs off roofs, roadways, sidewalks and lawns picking up oil, metals, salts, pet waste, fertilizer, grass clippings and other materials. Stormwater runoff ultimately flows into storm drains, which lead directly to our local rivers and streams.

HOW DO COMMERCIAL CAR WASHES CONTRIBUTE TO STORMWATER POLLUTION?

- Toxic chemicals such as hydrofluoric acid, phosphates from detergents, lubricants and oil.
- Debris and sediments washed from vehicles.
- Litter.

BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES (BMP): Behaviors and practices used by individuals to prevent or reduce stormwater pollution impacts.



CHEMICAL USE



Take care not to overuse, or allow chemicals, lubricants and oils to spill out of containers.



CONTROL LITTER



Pick up any litter in an around the car wash to keep it from entering storm drains and nearby waterways.



ROUTINE MAINTENANCE



If your car wash has a grit trap, have it cleaned regularly with sludge properly handled and disposed of.

ECO FRIENDLY DETERGENT



Use biodegradable, phosphate free, fragrance free and dye free detergents.

HOW DOES LANDSCAPING & LAWN CARE CONTRIBUTE TO STORMWATER POLLUTION?

- Fertilizer and pesticide applications.
- Gas, oil, and lubricant leaks from lawn equipment.
- Excessive and or misdirected watering leading to surface runoff.

BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES (BMP): Behaviors and practices used by individuals to prevent or reduce stormwater pollution impacts.



SAVE WATER



Be sure sprinklers are not watering the cement and are turned off during rain events.



TEST



Always perform a soil test before fertilizer addition.



MULCH



Mulch leaves and grass clippings into the lawn to add nutrients and control weeds.



CLEAN UP



After fertilizer or pesticide application be sure to sweep any excess from sidewalks and driveways back onto the lawn, to keep chemicals out of storm drains.



GO NATIVE



Establish a buffer zone along shorelines and streambanks using native vegetation.



MAINTENANCE



Be sure lawn equipment is properly maintained, running efficiently and not leaking.



MOW HIGH



Never cut more than 1/3 the height of grass. Leaving grass longer allows for strong root development and less room for weeds.



WHAT IS STORMWATER POLLUTION?

When rain falls and snow melts, the runoff produced picks up a variety of contaminants such as oil, metals, salts, pet waste, fertilizer, grass clippings as it flows over roofs, roadways, sidewalks and lawns. Stormwater runoff ultimately flows into storm drains.

HOW DO SCHOOLS CONTRIBUTE TO STORMWATER POLLUTION?

- Abundance of impervious surfaces
- Lawn care
- Litter
- Bus yards and maintenance garages

Remember: storm drains lead directly to our local rivers and streams.

BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES (BMP): Behaviors and practices used by individuals to prevent or reduce stormwater pollution impacts.



GO GREEN

- When re-paving parking lots, incorporate green islands with native plants and trees.



CLEAN UP

- Host clean up events with students, parents and teachers to pick up litter around the school.



PLANT POWER

- Allow mowed areas to grow, and install native plants to support wildlife and improve filtration of stormwater.



SLOW THE FLOW

- Direct downspouts to a raingarden or vegetated area to slow the flow of stormwater.



EDUCATE

- Include stormwater education in the classroom. Students can install a raingarden, plant native plants, or participate in a clean up activity.



SWEEP

- Sweep impervious surfaces like parking lots and garages to collect and dispose of salt and other debris.



STORE

- Practice good housekeeping such as storing chemicals indoors in regulated containers, correct labeling, and keeping a spill kit on hand.



CAPTURE

- Consider installing and maintaining catch basin filters.



WHAT IS STORMWATER POLLUTION?

When it rains, water runs off roofs, roadways, sidewalks and lawns picking up oil, metals, salts, pet waste, fertilizer, grass clippings and other materials.

This stormwater runoff ultimately flows into storm drains, which lead directly to our local rivers and streams.

HOW DO COMPOSTING FACILITIES CONTRIBUTE TO STORMWATER POLLUTION?

- **Sedimentation-** sediment particles and organic matter washed away from compost materials enter local water bodies, covering important aquatic habitat features and contributing to the loss of wetlands.
- **Pollutant Loading** – excess nutrients and chemical pollutants get carried to local waterways by stormwater, causing nutrient imbalance, eutrophication, and overall habitat degradation.

Composting facilities can negatively impact local waterbodies and wildlife through excess sedimentation, excess nutrients, and chemical pollutants.

This publication provides composting facilities best management practices (BMPs) on how to manage these facilities responsibly, to mitigate the illicit impacts of stormwater runoff.

WHAT?	HOW?	WHY?
Site Configuration	Aim to use natural slope of the land to separate stormwater and wastewater. Ensure slope still allows for plant growth to control sedimentation and stormwater runoff.	Strategic site configuration can limit the quantity of runoff carrying harmful pollutants into our waterways.
Exposure Reduction	Eliminate or minimize the amount of composting material exposed to precipitation. Roof structures are best, but tarps and canvas can act as a temporary solution.	Covering your compost materials from precipitation will reduce the amount of sediment, dissolved solids, nutrients, pathogens, and heavy metals washed into our stormwater system.
Vegetative Cover	Add native vegetation around your composting site.	Sediments, phosphorus, and other organic matter in stormwater can be reduced by adding native vegetation that slows water flow and promotes infiltration.
Rainwater Capture System	Add rain barrels or other rainwater harvesting system to roofed facilities to capture precipitation.	Capturing reduces the amount of stormwater runoff and provides facilities with a useable source of water for moisture control, dust control, or any other facility need.
Rain Garden	A shallow plot in the landscape filled with soil or mulch and various types of wetland-friendly native plants.	Rain gardens capture, hold, and filter contaminated stormwater runoff. Water that enters the rain garden is slowly filtered by the native vegetation to reduce the amount of suspended solids, excess nutrients, heavy metals, and other pollutants entering our waterways. Rain gardens can also enhance the habitat and aesthetic qualities of your landscape.

BMPs FOR HOMEOWNER ASSOCIATIONS (HOAs)

WHAT IS STORMWATER?

When it rains, water runs off roofs, roadways, sidewalks and lawns picking up oil, metals, salts, pet waste, fertilizer, grass clippings and other materials. Stormwater runoff ultimately flows into storm drains, which lead directly to our local rivers and streams.

HOW DO HOAs CONTRIBUTE TO STORMWATER POLLUTION?

- Improper management of retention & detention ponds
- Unintentional spread of invasive species
- Excess use of fertilizers, pesticides, herbicides, and road salt

Homeowner Associations often inherit the responsibility of operating and maintaining stormwater infrastructure, such as detention basins, bioswales, and rain gardens. They also manage large areas of impervious surfaces. Limited knowledge of best management practices (BMPs) can lead these structures to fail in their purpose of managing stormwater. This publication is intended to provide HOAs with environmentally friendly solutions to mitigate stormwater pollution and increase the efficiency of their stormwater management tools.

MANAGEMENT TOOL

COMMON ISSUE

BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICE

STORMWATER RETENTION POND



Eutrophication, or excessive algae growth.

Caused by excess nutrients (nitrogen and phosphorus) in fertilizer. Be sure to apply fertilizer in accordance with the label, and use low-phosphorus and slow-release fertilizers. Avoid the use of pesticides, herbicides, or fertilizers altogether, if possible.



Sedimentation, or the buildup of sediment in the pond or inlets and outlets.

Regularly inspect inlet pipes for sediment accumulation. If the sediment is blocking water flow, remove this sediment. Be sure to follow local and state regulations regarding dredging and sediment removal.



Invasive species like phragmites and reed canary grass can fill in a pond and lead to clogged inlets and outlets, flooding, sedimentation, and visibility issues.

Selectively remove invasive species such as phragmites and purple loosestrife. Reestablish this area with native vegetation. High plant diversity around your basin will improve wildlife habitat and reduce the risk of harmful algal blooms.



Excess road salt in stormwater runoff causes water quality issues and affects aquatic flora and fauna.

Avoid using road salt or use it sparingly. Store road salt on a flat, impervious surface and under a roof to avoid contributing to stormwater pollution.



Poor dumpster management leads to litter in stormwater runoff.

Be sure that dumpsters are emptied when full and the lids always remain closed. A “no-mow” zone or rain garden around stormwater systems can catch litter before it makes its way into our rivers.



Improper disposal of pet waste can lead to bacterial contamination in local streams and lakes.

Be sure to educate homeowners on the dangers of pet waste in our waters and encourage them to pick up after their pets. Supplying waste bags and trash cans in communal areas can help ensure the proper disposal of pet waste.



Excess grass clippings and other compostable waste can be a source of excess nutrients in our waters, leading to algae growth and eutrophication.

Educate homeowners on the proper disposal of compostable waste. Grass clippings and leaves should never be left on the sidewalk or in the street where they can easily wash into storm drains.



Communities often lack ample native wildlife habitat and are commonly overrun with harmful invasive species.

Rain gardens and native vegetation are excellent ways to boost wildlife habitat, increase aesthetically pleasing landscape, and curb the effects of stormwater runoff. Other ways you can increase the natural benefits in your community include implementing bird nesting boxes and native fish stockings.

MACHINE SHOP BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES (BMP'S)

When rain falls and snow melts, the runoff produced picks up a variety of contaminants such as oil, metals, salts, pet waste, fertilizer, and grass clippings as it flows over roofs, roadways, sidewalks and lawns.

Stormwater runoff ultimately flows into storm drains.

Remember: storm drains lead directly to our local rivers and streams.

HOW DO MACHINE SHOPS CONTRIBUTE TO STORMWATER POLLUTION?

- Through improper storage of chemicals, paints, metals, and other substances (this can include storage on porous pavement, storage containers that aren't double walled, leaky containers, or a lack of secondary containment such as dykes or berms).
- Improper disposal of products from equipment maintenance, such as cleaning solvents, oil, grease, and fuel.
- Improper disposal of swarf (chips/turnings/filings/shavings) that results from subtractive manufacturing.
- An insufficient spill response plan, or improper hazardous spill management.

BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES (BMP):

Behaviors and practices used by individuals and businesses to prevent or reduce stormwater pollution impacts.



- Sweep fabrication areas regularly to avoid heavy accumulation of swarf and use dry clean up methods instead of washing areas down.



- Place batteries, hazardous materials, and waste in secondary containers to avoid spills.



- Write a spill response plan and train employees annually.
- Have readily available spill kits, which can prevent a spill from entering storm drains.



- Store metal parts and equipment indoors where not exposed to precipitation. If something must be stored outside, apply a temporary cover such as a tarp or canvas.



- Frequently check all containers for leaks, or potential holes.



- Consistently train employees on good housekeeping and proper hazardous material management techniques.



- Never dump anything other than clean water directly into a storm drain!

HOW DO ACTIVITIES AT SCRAP METAL AND AUTO SALVAGE YARD FACILITIES CONTRIBUTE TO STORMWATER POLLUTION?

- Improper outdoor storage of vehicles, and parts with leaking engines, chipping paint, leaking hydraulic fluids, or bad batteries
- Improper disposal of filters, rags, and fluids associated with vehicle and equipment maintenance
- Improper disposal of washing, and steam cleaning wastewater from vehicle, equipment, and parts washing
- Spills and overfills of waste fluid due to operator error

BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES (BMP):

Behaviors and practices used by individuals to prevent or reduce stormwater pollution impacts.



Store cars, car parts and other items inside and out of the rain. This will help to keep pollutants out of storm drains. Tarps and canvas can act as temporary covers for materials being stored outside.



Store lead parts and batteries in a secondary, leakproof container.



Designate an area for equipment maintenance and cleaning. Use minimal cleaners and solvents. Never dump used cleaning water down storm drains. Use a utility sink that is connected to a sanitary sewer.



Use catch sleds, drip pans, or large plastic sheets to catch leaking fluids for proper disposal.



Safely remove pollutant sources (batteries, oil filters, fuel, mercury switches) as soon as possible when a vehicle enters the facility.



Practice good housekeeping, such as keeping updated logbooks, regular facility inspections, and employee training on best management practices.
